Making life better, the cooperative way

- 1. Air ducts and vents. Clearing out accumulated dust and dirt is both good for your lungs and your cooling system. You'll save energy and may even increase the system's lifespan.
- Windows and screens. Clean windows and screens allow more daylight in the home and reduce the need for using lighting lamps and fixtures. In addition to boosting energy efficiency,
- natural light may also boost overall health and productivity.
- 3. Air filters. A dirty filter reduces air flow, which then requires more force to move air through the blower, requiring the furnace to run longer and harder, using more power in the process. Replacing or washing dirty air filters can lower your energy consumption by up to 15%.

4. Refrigerator. Your refrigerator uses up to 14% of your home's electricity, so increasing its efficiency can make a notable difference in your electric bill. Start by cleaning the seals around the door to keep cold air from escaping. Next, remove old condiments and forgotten food. Keeping your fridge two-thirds full is ideal for improved circulation and energy efficiency. Last,

- vacuum away the accumulated dust bunnies from fridge coils. Filthy coils force the refrigerator to work harder, driving up your energy bill.
- Sliding door track. Dirt and grit in the track can ruin the door's seal and create gaps where conditioned air can escape.
- Electronics and lightbulbs. Dust keeps electronics and motors from running efficiently. Dust off your computer,

office equipment, electronics and even lightbulbs.

With minimal elbow grease, you can start the season with some energy-saving habits. You'll have a cleaner house and lower electric bill.

2. Don't block pad-mounted

transformers. Plant shrubs at least 10 feet away from transformer doors and 4 feet from transformer sides.




1. Plant trees in the right place. Trees

BLUE GRASS ENERGY EMPLOYEES RAISE \$15,374 FOR CASA

Final numbers are in for our 2023 corporate charity. Reflecting our purpose of making life better, the cooperative way, BGEnergy employees worked together to raise \$15,374 for Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA) organizations within the service area.

These funds will directly benefit CASA, a vital organization that advocates for the

welfare of abused and neglected children in the foster care system.

2023 marked the 10th anniversary of our employee-led corporate giving program. In those 10 years, employees have raised a total of \$150,194. Every dollar has gone directly to those making a difference in our 23 counties.



From Blue Grass Energy's Bylaws:

from each of the following districts: District 5 and District 8.
Directors serve a four-year term. The following, from Article IV, Section 5 of Blue Grass Energy's bylaws, outlines the nomination process.

Article IV, Section 5-It shall be the duty of the Board of Directors to appoint, not less than fifty (50) days and not more than one hundred. twenty (120) days before the date of a meeting the members at which a report of the election of directors is to be made a committee on nominations consisting of not less than five (5) nor more than ten (10) members who shall be selected so as to give equitable representation on the committee to the geographical areas served or to be served by the Cooperative. No officer or member of the Board of Directors shall be appointed a member of such committee. The committee shall prepare and post at the principal office of the Cooperative at least forty-five (45) days before the meeting, a list of nominations for Board of Directors.

One-half percent (1/2%) or more

of the total number of consumers shown on the Financial and Statistical Report of RUS Form 7 as of December 31 of the calendar year preceding the election may make other nominations in writing over their original dated signatures, signed within 120 days prior to the annual meeting, together with printed names, telephone numbers, and addresses by filing such nominations not more than ninety (90) days and not less than fifty (50) days prior to the meeting and the Secretary shall post the same at the same place where the list of nominations made by the committee is posted, if, after examination of the Provost, it is determined by said Provost that said petitions meet the requirements of the Bylaws, Articles of Consolidation, and the laws of the Commonwealth of Kentucky. In no event shall a member sign more than one petition for the nomination of a director from a district. All nominating petitions shall be submitted on the form of "Nomination Petition" provided by the cooperative. All nominees shall certify their qualifications by signing a "Certification of

Candidate for Director" and completing the "Application for Candidate for Director" form provided by cooperative and file same with the cooperative not less than 50 days before the date of the meeting of the members.

The date of the first working day not less than forty-five (45) days prior to the Annual Meeting shall be established as the certificate date which determines whether a member is in good standing and qualified for the purpose of signing a nominating petition and/or voting.

A member in good standing is any active member who is in compliance with the Bylaws, Rules and Regulations of the Cooperative, and Rules and Regulations of the Public Service Commission as of forty-five (45) days prior to the Annual Membership Meeting. The Secretary shall deliver a list of members in good standing on the certification date to the Provost.

Any member, whose service is disconnected for any reason, will automatically become a nonvoting member until said member is reconnected and receiving electrical current.
