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### MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT Remember safety when going back to school

Summer is winding down and the return to school is just days away. Now is a good time to remind your students about electrical safety.

Many of our younger members like to play outside so it is important to teach them to steer clear of padmount transformers (those big green boxes) or other electrical equipment. And as tempting as it may be, share with them to not place objects, such as pens or pencils, in electrical outlets or electric appliances like toasters.

For our high school and college-age members, remind them not to overload electrical outlets. Many classrooms and dorms are not equipped to handle today's use of electronic appliances and gadgets. Wall plugs can be stressed before you realize it.

Another good practice is to not pull an electrical cord from the wall. Pulling on a cord that is plugged into an electrical outlet can damage the appliance, the plug, or the outlet.

And even if you don't have a returning student, this month is still a good time to think about safety at your home. For example, when making improvements around your home, always be aware of overhead and underground power lines. If you are thinking of a landscape project this fall, be sure you call 811 a few days before beginning your work so all underground utilities can be located for you.

Moneyhon said, "Financially, the good news is we continue to remain competitive—not only in our area but nationally as well. In other good news, we just returned about \$2.1 million in capital credits to you, our members. In just the last five years, we have returned nearly \$10 million to our communities through capital credits."

Moneyhon's speech was followed by the installation of Director Gary Keller, District 4, then comments were heard from President/CEO Mike Williams.

"Because of the lessons learned this past year, I can say without a doubt, we are better positioned to serve our members into the future," Williams stated. He went on to share that 2020 resulted in Blue Grass Energy's highest member satisfaction score ever achieved and one of the highest reliability numbers in our 84 years. Following his address, the virtual meeting was adjourned.
